Rain gives church organ a 'croak'

A ONE-HUNDRED-YEAR-OLD four-manual concert organ, valued at over £50,000 and one of the finest in the Rossendale area, was badly damaged by rain leaking into St James's Church, Haslingden.

"It is very upsetting," the Rev Andrew Ballard, vicar, told the Free Press. "Fortunately it can still be used for ordinary services. It is the choir section of the organ which has suffered most and while our organist usually brings it into use during services he can use alternatives."

The damage was discovered by Mr John Cryer, organist when preparing for the Sunday service.
"We have not established

"We have not established yet how the water got in," Mr Ballard said.

The church has been undergoing repairs because of roof damage for some time.

Organ builders have been called into assess the extent of the damage and will make a report to the insurers.

"When repairs can start we don't know," Mr Ballard said. "We had been planning a programme of restoration for the organ but now it will be the choir section which will have to be done first."

The organ was built in 1878 by Henry Willis and remodelled and enlarged 50 years ago. It was overhauled in 1962 by a Liverpool firm and is now being maintained by a Manchester firm.

"The choir section is a very pleasant section of the organ," said Mr Ballard. "We have a recital booked for 8 September by an organ student from Reading University, Timothy Rishton. Fortunately his programme is one that can be accommodated on the rest of the organ."

Rossendale Organists' Association gives one recital a year on it and other well known organists have used it.
